Taylor, Texas Batting and Quilts

Many are familiar with the quilts made from the patterns printed on the inside of the Mountain Mist Batting wrappers, but few know that the Taylor Bedding Company of Taylor, Texas participated in a similar promotional scheme.

Taylor Bedding was founded in 1903 by D. F. Forwood who had cotton grown in the Taylor, Texas area to made up into mattresses for his furniture store. Others furniture stores wanted the mattresses and so his business shifted to the making of mattresses, upholstered furniture, mattress covers and quilt batting. The company took the Morning Glory as its logo stating that if you slept on their mattress, you would "wake up in the morning feeling glorious."

This company although founded in a small Texas town in the Austin area, thought big. Forwood took his small daughter Virginia with him when he went to pitch the mattresses to J. C. Penney and ended up being awarded a contract to make mattresses with the J. C. Penney label. They won an award for the mattresses they supplied for military cots during World War II as seen in the following ad. And they secured Tom Landry, famed coach of the Dallas Cowboys, as a spokesperson.

As a promotion, each package of batting came with a coupon that could be mailed in to receive a booklet of quilt patterns from the Taylor company. A quilt made from a pattern similar to that on the cover of the 1930s booklet recently was donated to the Museum of Texas Tech University. Its colors continue to be vibrant, and the quilt is beautiful. It is hand appliquéd, and hand quilted around the appliqué motifs. The pattern for this quilt is among those in the 1930s Taylor-made booklet.

Later during the quilt revival of the 1970s, the company produced quilts books by Barbara Taylor, who was probably not an actual woman, but a name chosen to represent the company in the same way that Betty Crocker was not a real woman, but a name designed to give the company a more feminine appearance.

During the 1950s the Taylor Bedding company also made and sold quilts. In 1953. Virginia's husband, Lee R. Lawrence a hog buyer, offered a free "Morning Glory quilt" with a retail value of \$9.95 for every 10 hogs a customer brought to his Katy Stock Pens. He was a buyer who then took the hogs to San Antonio to the Ragline meat packing company. It is unknown what these quilts looked like, so information is sought on that as well. It is possible that they were in a pattern similar to that recently donated to the museum, but the handwork on that particular quilt makes it seem unlikely that this was the type being sold for \$9.95 in the 1950s. The Taylor Company also offered their quilts as door prizes to local events as seen in this ad for the Taylor Kiwanis Club.

Founder David Forwood ran the company into the 1950s when it was taken over by his daughter Virginia Forwood Lawrence. She guided the company through its 75th anniversary before it was taken over by the children of her siblings, who had a 2/3rds interest in the company compared to her 1/3rd. The company was dissolved in 1995.

The son and daughter of Virginia Forwood and Lee Lawrence have been very helpful in supplying information about the company and images. However, what the Taylor quilts that were sold for \$9.95 looked like has yet to be identified. It is hoped with this article that those who have quilts made by the Taylor Bedding Company, or with Taylor batting or patterns will contact the museum at marian.ann.montgomery@ttu.edu to share what they know.

Celebrating American Craft 2026



<u>Craft in America</u> is pleased to announce the launch of **Handwork: Celebrating American Craft 2026**, a national Semiquincentennial initiative to showcase the importance of the handmade, both throughout our history and in contemporary life.

Handwork 2026 will be a year-long collaboration among organizations, educators, and makers to celebrate the diversity of the crafts that define America, bringing compelling stories and underrepresented art and artists into the spotlight.

Craft is universal and democratic; it unites us by bringing people of all backgrounds and beliefs together. A deeply important carrier of tradition and cultural practice, the handmade connects us through history and time.

The <u>Renwick Gallery of the Smithsonian American Art Museum</u>, the national museum dedicated to American craft, is the lead partner for the initiative and will host the core exhibition for the project.

<u>Americans for the Arts</u>, a leading non-profit organization for advancing the arts and arts education, is the Awareness partner for this project.

Handwork 2026 will focus on the following programs:

EXHIBITIONS

Handwork: Celebrating American Craft 2026 culminates with a CORE EXHIBITION opening in late 2026 at the Renwick Gallery of the Smithsonian American Art Museum. Museums and art centers joining as participants in the Handwork 2026 initiative will complete the rich diversity of interpretations on the work of the hand with EXHIBITIONS and related programs throughout the year. We invite all museums and regional arts centers to join this effort with the craft-centric, culture-based exhibitions you are planning for the year 2026.

DOCUMENTARY FILM SERIES & DIGITAL CONTENT

A four-part DOCUMENTARY FILM SERIES will be produced by the team behind the Peabody Award-winning, PBS national series *Craft in America*. The series will present a rich, democratic exploration of the handmade in traditional, studio, ethnic, and contemporary practices. *Handwork 2026* plans to partner with PBS and their 350+ independent member stations to broadcast and stream both current and archival craft programs, including new digital programs for YouTube and social media audiences.

BOOK

Presenting the extraordinary range of the handmade in the United States, the *Handwork 2026* BOOK will feature craft history, artists, materials and processes, focusing on undertold stories. The book will be object-based. It will include essays by leading experts, images of exquisite handmade objects and a craft timeline. It will illuminate the contributions of craftspeople throughout our history. It will be one of the first and only books to bridge history by exploring the craft continuum over the span of American culture.

EDUCATION

The EDUCATION component of *Handwork 2026* will include interdisciplinary learning initiatives at all levels of the education system, with a special focus on grades K–12. It will take a wide look at the history, cultural traditions, and impact of craft in the United States, from Indigenous origins until today. Marilyn Stewart PhD, a nationally recognized art educator and author of art textbooks, will oversee the creation of the education guides. The guides will include hands-on craft activities and will be available on <u>craftinamerica.org</u> and handwork2026.org.

ENGAGEMENT

In partnership with local, state and national organizations, *Handwork 2026* will be amplified by a robust SOCIAL MEDIA campaign, and all activities joining the national celebration will be documented on a comprehensive, aggregate WEBSITE: <u>handwork2026.org</u>.

Handwork: Celebrating American Craft 2026 an idea envisioned by a group

of dedicated craft professionals and artists, takes its inspiration from a similar project, <u>Year of American Craft 1993</u>, that benefitted millions of artists, makers and appreciators. Much has changed in America since 1993, but the practice of making things by hand endures. The crafts built our nation and they sustain it through challenging times. Nationwide programs will honor American makers, then and now, pointing the way to a robust future for the crafts and the country.
